Brief History

Now under the new name of Prairie Christian Academy, Prairie General Education has been operating since 1938 as an extension of Prairie Bible Institute. Back then, Prairie's founder, J. Fergus Kirk was concerned that his children and others in the community had a Christ centered education. Growing from the original class of 11, PCA now has over 350 students in its Kindergarten to Grade 12 programs. Students have come from all over the world to study in these halls and graduate into hundreds of vocations and careers.

In September 2003 steps were made to form Prairie Christian Academy, an alternate school under the Golden Hills School District. This decision not only increased resources for our educational system, but also gave the primary stakeholders – the parents – more of a governing position in their children's education. The distinctive of Bible based teaching and discipleship is still at the cornerstone of Prairie Christian Academy. We embrace the godly heritage that is ours, and look forward to the future of continuing to provide quality education that is fully integrated with God's word and Christian principles.

Outreach

Jesus calls us to reach out to each other, to the larger community and to the world. Students are involved in various projects including: Christmas shoe boxes, donations for food bank, carol singing, sponsoring several Third World children and missionaries and visiting and helping seniors. Students are encouraged to bring a donation at each weekly chapel to support these projects.

Working Together

As with all organizations, clear lines of communication are crucial. The staff of Prairie Christian Academy seek to communicate through emails, texts, information meetings, parent/teacher interviews, personal interaction, report cards and newsletters. In the case of individual concerns or conflicts, we are committed to the Matthew 18 principles as outlined below.

- 1. The family directly involved with the conflict or concern should go to the staff member involved and seek to resolve it at that level.
- 2. If the matter remains unresolved, the parent should refer it to the associate principal or principal.

All communication should take place with care, sensitivity and respect for each of the parties involved.

Academic

Computer access

All students will have a user name and password. It is strongly emphasized that these passwords not be shared with anyone. Our GHSD Tech department monitors the school computers and blocks out inappropriate sites and keeps track of any attempts to enter inappropriate sites.

Course Selection

Prairie Christian Academy Secondary School seeks to offer subjects that will meet the needs of as wide a range of student abilities and interests as possible. Details of courses offered can be found in the High School Program Guide. If students need assistance, they can arrange to meet with a teacher or counselor. All students are expected to pursue academic excellence in all courses. Students should attempt at all times to be diligent and organized. If a problem begins to develop, students should not hesitate to speak to their teacher or counselor.

Grade 10, 11, 12

The senior years of high school are extremely important for a number of reasons. Graduation requirements are calculated on the basis of courses taken at the grade ten, eleven and twelve levels. Courses need to be carefully considered with post secondary goals and requirements in mind. All students completing core grade twelve courses are required to write Provincial Examinations. Admission competition for university faculties is high, so excellent grades are essential. Scholarships and other forms of financial assistance are available to those who have demonstrated strong initiative and ability. In light of this, we would like to make the following suggestions to students as they enter their last three years at Prairie Christian Academy Secondary School.

- Choose your courses wisely: Keep your options open by meeting general requirements. It is wise to take more than just the minimal required courses.
- **Balance your workload,** in consultation with the school counselor, so that you do not have one very light semester and one very heavy semester.
- Take at least one course in the first semester that you find very difficult. This will then give you the possibility of re-doing the class in the second semester or taking it by correspondence.
- Make your studies the main focus of your energies in grade twelve. Be careful how you manage your time and how many other activities you commit yourself to during the year.
- If you must have employment, limit your hours to a manageable schedule. We strongly recommend that a student not be employed more than ten to fifteen hours a week.
- Be prepared to spend an average of at least two hours a day on homework. Some days will be heavier than others. Budget your time and work ahead on projects and review.
- **Be diligent in attending all classes.** Outside of sickness and compassionate reasons, you should NOT be away from school.
- Make the most of class time. Learn to use the small portions of time wisely; five or ten minutes here and there can make a big difference.

- Seek extra help immediately if you are struggling. Don't allow yourself to fall behind.
- Maintain an active devotional life. You will find a great deal of peace and renewal of strength if you learn to abide in Him. Remember -- "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness and ALL these things shall be added to you." Matt. 6:33

Course Changes

Course changes may be made during the first two weeks of classes in each semester. All requests for course changes must be approved by the principal. A student who drops a course must have parental/guardian approval. Course drops for core subject classes will be considered beyond the two week period following a discussion with parents/guardians.

Textbooks

Texts will be provided by the school as needed. Students are responsible for all textbooks issued to them. All books are numbered and a record of books issued and their condition will be kept by the classroom teacher. Students will be charged for lost or damaged books. Refunds will not be given if textbooks are returned after the end of the school year.

Bible Requirement:

Prairie Christian Academy requires all students to take the Bible course offered at each grade level. Bible class is considered a significant part of the student's education. Since the course tends to have a variety of assignments that focus on class participation, personal reflection and biblical contemplation, students normally excel. Failure to pass may preclude a student's re-registration the following year. Students in grade 12 who do not pass their Bible course will not have fulfilled the requirements for participation in school convocation.

Distance Learning:

PCA offers a distance Learning Program (DLP) that allows students to take select courses which are not in our time table or which are, but do not fit into the students' schedule. DLP courses are conducted through our partner schools, Northstar Academy and Golden Hills Learning Academy.

Grade System

Grades will be reported as a percentage grade. For any grade 7-11 student to be on the 'Honour Roll', they must obtain an 80% average, using a weighted average of all their classes. For grade 12 students, 'Honour Roll' is awarded as the Timothy Award using the average of marks in Philosophy of Man, ELA 12 and their next best 3 grade 12 core classes.

Student Conduct

You will be encouraged to demonstrate a Christian work ethic. We not only want you to have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ, but we want you to enjoy a life of spiritual fullness, holiness and service. Prairie Christian Academy Secondary School functions as a body of Christian believers joined together for the specific purpose of training students how to live, not just how to make a living; how to be leaders, not just followers. In order to facilitate this process, it is essential that students, faculty and parents seek to promote Christian behavior.

The school cannot isolate its students from the constant sensual bombardment of this society, but it can create an environment where right conduct is encouraged. A positive peer culture helps to stem the tide against the pressures encountered.

We recognize that the observance of standards does not make one spiritual; however, one's willingness to adhere to school regulations demonstrates maturity and a level of spiritual desire. The apostle Paul wrote to a young Timothy, "discipline yourself for the purpose of godliness" (1 Tim. 4:7).

Prairie Christian Academy is a community of staff and students from a wide range of cultural, denominational, and social backgrounds. We look to the person of Jesus Christ to define our common values and unity. We seek to honor Him by integrating faith and learning, while our hearts and lives reflect the process of maturing in Christ. We believe that the Bible articulates those principles and values expected of all believers.

Attendance and Tardiness

The purpose of this policy is to ensure that students get to class on time and that all students enjoy uninterrupted learning. This policy applies to all students.

Lates: Students are expected to be on time for class with all the materials they are expected to need. After three unexcused lates, the teacher will communicate with the student and parents about the importance of being on time for classes. Further lates will be directed to the school office. Administrators, students, parents, and teachers will work together to ensure that it is not a recurring habit.

Unexcused absence: An unexcused absence is defined as a student missing a class without permission from a parent or guardian. It will be documented as an unexcused absence if the student does not show up for the class within 15 minutes of the start time. Teachers will contact the parent or guardian informing them of the absence and their concerns. If attendance does not improve students will meet with Administration. Parents will be consulted and informed of measures taken to enhance student success.

Other Expectations Regarding Attendance: Students are responsible for finding out about and completing missed schoolwork. Missed evaluations must be completed.

Excused absence: The parent (or guardian) must contact either the office or the teacher noting the reason for the absence for it to be considered excused.

Planned absence: Any student planning to be away from school for any reason needs to let the office AND their teachers know ahead of time. Teachers may not be able to provide work ahead of time and students may need to catch up when they return.

Early Dismissal: Students who need to leave during the day must sign out at the school office. Students are not permitted to leave the school building without express permission from parents/guardians. Repeated offenses will be treated as skipping. Students who leave early must also inform teachers of the classes they will miss. Students who leave early are responsible for work missed.

Academic Integrity

PCA regards academic honesty as essential to learning concepts and developing skills. It is expected that all school work submitted for the purpose of meeting course requirements represents the original efforts of the individual student. This includes, but not limited to, test taking, homework, class assignments, and the original creation of essays, compositions, and research papers.

As the internet becomes increasingly more accessible and sophisticated, the incidents of plagiarism and cheating in student work have increased. Many institutions of higher education penalize plagiarism with student expulsion. In an interest of the students further education, as well as the school's part in the personal development of students, PCA will follow the below guidelines on plagiarism and cheating:

- 1. First instance: Teacher will have a discussion with the student and contact the parent. Student will redo the assignment/test or be given an alternate assignment in the office. Administration is notified by the teacher as well.
- 2. Second instance: Student will redo the assignment/quiz or be given an alternate assignment in the office and may be assigned to the office for multiple periods. Administration meets with the student and contacts parents to work through a plan for future success.
- 3. Third instance: Administration meets again with the student and parents. The student will be given an in school suspension.

Harassment

Both the Ministry of Education and the Boards of Public and Independent Schools have, in recent years, tried to develop some very clear definitions and policies to eradicate harassment. Please read this section carefully. It is our intention to define what we mean by harassment and also to outline very clearly the serious manner in which we will deal with incidences of harassment in our school.

What is Harassment?

Reduced to its simplest terms, harassment is a continuous and repeated practice of annoyance. This includes any unwelcome comments or conduct directed at another individual. Recipient response is important. Repeated comments or behaviors which are meant to be humorous or playful, yet are disturbing to the recipient, fall into this category. How the person receiving the attention feels about it is the determining factor in its appropriateness. It is important to know that the Alberta Code of Human Rights is a multi-page document that addresses the issue of harassment and this legal document has ramifications for students in school, for individuals in the workplace and for society at large. Consequently, we will deal seriously with cases of harassment. The Code addresses, among others, the following areas that could be the subject of discriminatory comments or conduct: race, color, ancestry, place of origin, political beliefs, religious beliefs, family status, physical/mental disability, and gender.

What kinds of things can fall under the category of harassment?

- Insulting, suggestive or derogatory language or gestures.
- Teasing even when done in "fun"; recipient response is **important** to note.
- Unwelcome physical contact includes things like bullying, fighting and sexual contact.
- Offensive remarks, racial/ethnic jokes, innuendo.
- Leering
- Displaying of pornographic, racial or other offensive material.
- Offensive or derogatory communication through notes, mail, e-mail, fax or any other medium.
- Persistent invitations which are unwelcome or which are perceived to be unwelcome.

How should we act?

At Prairie Christian Academy Secondary School we want all students to feel safe, accepted and welcome. Although issues of harassment may be issues of "law", they are, at the root, issues of relationship. We want our relationships to be founded on Scriptures that urge us to treat others as we would like to be treated and to esteem others better than ourselves.

We **must** refrain from all of the above mentioned activities.

We **must** always be aware of recipient response to what we say and do.

We **must** be quick to apologize and make amends when our words or actions are offensive or thoughtless.

Consequences for harassment

Depending on the severity of the incident, parents will be notified and the offending student suspended. If this type of behavior is repeated, a student can expect to be expelled from the school.

The goal of all discipline is:

- 1. repentance (accept responsibility and determine to change)
- 2. resolution (find ways to keep it from happening again self discipline)
- 3. reconciliation (bring healing and restore relationship)

A wide range of methods and approaches are used at the discretion of the teachers, counselors and administrators. Wherever appropriate, parents are kept informed and involved in the discipline process.

Discipline

Occasionally, some students have lapses of appropriate behavior. Minor offenses are dealt with immediately by teacher/deans. Major offenses are channeled through the principal's office and are dealt with on a case by case basis. As a result of a meeting between the parties and gathering of information, the seriousness of the matter is determined. For serious or persistent violations of school rules and regulations and for display of attitudes which hinder the growth of other students, suspension and/or expulsion may result. Actions such as social dancing, the use of tobacco, alcohol, and non-prescribed drugs are not acceptable behaviors for students in our school. The same could be said about the use of pornography and participation in elicit sexual conduct. Such actions will bring about penalties such as suspensions or even expulsions, depending on the severity of the situation.

Dress and Grooming

We expect our students to dress in a fashion that is appropriate for a Christian school setting. Therefore, tops should not include questionable writing or pictures for a Christian context and should have adequate coverage over shoulders and the midriff. Shorts and skirts should be an appropriate length for a school setting and pants should not have rips above the appropriate shorts length. Clothing should cover undergarments and be in keeping with the development of godly morals and character. Students should not wear hats or hoods in school.

General Information

Lockers and Locks

Students will be assigned lockers by the office. For high school students, there will be a \$10 deposit charged through School Cash Online at the start of the year. At the end of the year, students will receive this money back if their locker is cleaned out properly.

If students wish to lock their lockers **ONLY SCHOOL LOCKS** are permitted on the lockers. If a lock is lost, a \$5.00 replacement fee is charged. Students are encouraged **NOT TO GIVE LOCKER COMBINATIONS TO OTHER STUDENTS**. Students have no right to privacy in their lockers as the school conducts inspections from time to time.

Cell Phones

PCA is committed to ensure that the school is a safe and caring place with a focus on learning. In accordance with the Alberta Government Ministerial Order, we are restricting personal mobile device use in our school for all ages.

Personal Mobile-Devices are defined as any personal electronic device that can be used to communicate with or access the internet or cellular network, such as a cellphone, tablet, computer, gaming device, or smartwatch.

Personal Mobile Device Use: For grades K-9, the use of personal mobile devices are not permitted for use by students during both instructional and non-instructional time. Students are required to keep their phones powered off or silent and stored out of view throughout the school day. For grades 10-12, students may use their phones during non-instructional times (breaks, lunch, spares). For students on a spare, they may use their phone while in the common area, but not in an instructional space. They are also expected to be respectful of other students in the common area who are not on a spare, and not be distracting with their device.

If there is a medical reason or special learning needs for a student that would require limited use of a personal mobile device it will be approved by administration on a case-by-case basis.

Social media: Students are prohibited from accessing social media on the school networks or devices. Social media sites include but are not limited to Facebook, Flickr, Foursquare, Instagram, Linkedin, Pinterest, Quora, Reddit, Snapchat, Tencent, X(Twitter), Tumbler, and TikTok, Yahoo.Groups, Yammer, and a variety of less known services.

Consequences for inappropriate possession and/or usage shall be progressive and may include:

- 1. Confiscation of phone and pickup by student at the office at the end of the day. Parent must contact school to give permission for student to take the phone.
- 2. Teacher will have conversation with student and/or parent guardian
- 3. Repeated infractions may result in further consequences.

Use of School Phones (land lines)

A phone is available in the school office as well as in each classroom. Students may ask permission to use a phone for a short call only.

Lost and Found

A lost and found box is provided in the gym entry way. Please check it periodically for articles which may have been lost or misplaced. The lost and found articles that are not claimed will periodically be donated to charities. (Items in lost and found are not available for the taking.)

Bicycles

Bicycles must be parked in the stands provided and we recommend that they be securely locked at all times. Students 16 years of age and under must wear a helmet by law but it is recommended that all students wear a helmet regardless of age.

Skateboards and Scooters

Skateboards and Scooters are allowed to be ridden to and from school. Riders must wear a helmet at all times while on school property. Skateboards and scooters must NOT be ridden during school hours on school property, only to and from school.

Fire Drills

Procedures for fire drills are posted in each classroom. Teachers will review these procedures with the student. During a fire alarm, please exit in a quiet, calm and orderly manner, and obey all requests made by the supervisor.

Photocopier/Printers

Students may photocopy/print necessary materials for school work in the Learning Commons. Black and white copies only. Color copies may be made by special permission only.

Field Trips

Students will have opportunities to go on various field trips throughout the year. If there is a cost to the field trip, the procedure will be as follows:

- An item will be created in School Cash Online and will be attached to all applicable students as an optional fee with the due date as the day of the event.
- Parents/Students will log into School Cash Online, pay for the trip and print off the receipt.
- Receipt needs to be brought into the office, then the field trip form (permission slip) will be emailed to both parents and students. Paper copies will be available at the office as needed. (We can also run a report showing if the item has been paid)
- Completed field trip forms are to be given to the teacher in charge of the field trip.

Visitors

All visitors must report to the school office. Guests wishing to visit classes must obtain authorization from the principal. PRIOR TO THE DAY OF A VISIT, a student may sponsor a visit by seeking permission from all teachers involved.

SPORTS POLICY

Prairie Christian Academy Secondary Athletics provide:

- An opportunity for students to pursue their talents and abilities.
- A "showcase" representing our school within the community and the province.
- A program with which students can identify and support as part of their school.
- A program in which students can experience team spirit and accomplishment.

Philosophy/Mission

The mission of the Athletics program is to develop individual skills, discipline, excellence in performance, and Christian character.

Program Focus:

- To encourage students to be good stewards of their talents and abilities as unto the glory of God (EXCELLENCE, in character and performance).
- To provide our athletes the opportunity to compete in a healthy and controlled environment with structure and discipline, working from a Christ-centered perspective.
- To learn the principles of sacrifice, hard work, commitment, self-denial and unity in spirit and purpose for the accomplishment of something bigger than self.
- To teach students that they are AMBASSADORS for our school, our community, and most importantly, living testimonies of the grace of God.
- To help students learn how to transfer lessons that they learn in athletics to situations they may face later in life
- To develop the full potential of the team; this based in individual development.

General Expectations:

- Relationships should be built on the Christian model.
- The TEAM takes priority over personal interests.
- A commitment to represent oneself, the team, and the school in a positive light is a standard expectation.
- All players are expected to abide by the general rules given in the Student Handbook including behavioral expectations and academic policies.
- Players who are absent from school are not permitted to play on that day.
- Players who are sick and miss school the day of a practice will not be able to practice but within reason (medically), are expected to be at practice and observe.
- Winning is important, but the ultimate measurement of a player's involvement is:
 - o The character development of the individual
 - The spirit and unity of the team
 - o The depth of relationships between the players, and between the players and coach
 - o The reputation gained by the team in the school and the community

Our Christian witness is more important than winning. Our Christian standards and testimony must never be comprised for the sake of winning.

Realities of Prairie Christian Academy Secondary Athletics

- It is a privilege to be a member of the team, not a right
- Membership must be earned (based on character and ability).
- Individuals will have to compete with fellow members for positions and responsibilities.
- More gifted athletes will play more dominant roles.
- The team operates on an apprenticeship model (i.e. young and/or inexperienced players need to be groomed and learn from more seasoned players).
- The coach sets goals for the team after the talent base of the athletes has been assessed.
- We wish to compete at the appropriate level in leagues and tournaments.
- All athletes have equal value and worth as individuals created in the image of God. Therefore, we do not equate their role on the team as having special status (there is no room for prima donnas or selfish pride in these talents and abilities).
